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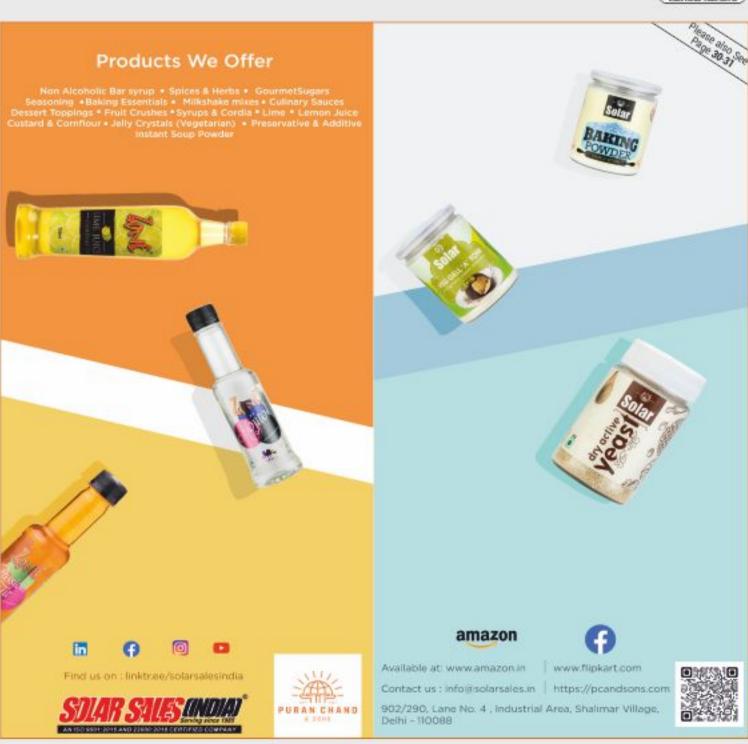

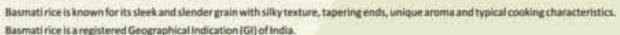

About Rice: Rice is the staple food for half the world population and 90% of global rice production happens in Asian continent with China and India being No1 and No 2 producers. India produces a large number of non basmati rice varieties across provinces.

India also produces Basmati rice – the Scented Pearl – in a geographically designated region falling under the foothills of Himalayas and encompassing the provinces of Punjab, Haryana, Uttarakhand, Himachai Pradesh, Delhi, Western Uttar Pradesh and three districts of Jammu Division in Jammu & Kashmir State.



Rice Production in India: India produces around 118 million metric tonnes of rice of which around 8 million tonnes is Basmati Rice.

Rice Exports: India exports around 4.5 million tonnes of Basmati rice and 8-12 million tonnes of non Basmati rice. During the current fiscal 2020-21 India is expected to touch a record overall rice export figure in the vicinity of 14-14.5 million tonnes.

# Rains improve corn crop condition in Argentina

ecent rains have improved the crop conditions of the lateplanted corn crop in Argentina, which has seen drought hitting the early-planted corn crops. The area of 2021-22 corn crops under excellent or good condition rose to 32% as of Jan. 26, the Buenos Aires Grain Exchange, known as BAGE, said in a report. "Rains have continued to increase water reserves in most of the agricultural area. Planting conditions improved in the provinces of Salta, Tucuman, and Santiago del Estero, where a large part of the area to be sown is concentrated," BAGE said in the report. While the recent rains have raised the hopes of higher yield in the late-planted corn crop following the losses in the early corn due to drought, analysts warn that more rain is needed in February. "If the rains continue, we are going to achieve an average yield higher than that of early-planted corn," Rosario Grains Exchange, known as the BCR said in a report. If it does not rain abundantly in February, the production potential of the lateplanted corn will not be sustained, the BCR said in the report.

The increased soil moisture, along with cooler temperatures, has led to a significant reduction in crop stress across central and southern Argentina, with dryness now limited to far northeastern



Argentina. The BCR recently cut Argentina's 2021-22 MY corn production forecast by 8 million mt to 48 million mt due to the drought. The 2021-22 corn crop will be marketed over March 2022-February 2023. Argentina, one of the top exporters of corn, had produced 52 million mt of corn in 2020-21, according to the BCR report. Meanwhile, the US Department of Agriculture's attache in Argentina cut corn production outlook to 51 million mt in 2021-22, 3 million mt below the official USDA forecast. The USDA's attache report also warned that if conditions continue to be on the dry side, the current production projection most likely will have an additional cut. Argentina's early corn is usually planted in September-October and harvested in April-May, while the late corn crop is planted in December-January and harvested in June-July.

#### Bangladesh preparing roadmap for increased rice output

he government is set to prepare a roadmap aiming to increase rice production amid a growing demand of the main staple in the country. Prices of rice increased recently despite record productions of Aush, Aman and Boro paddies during harvesting seasons and storing the highest quantity of rice by the government in its silos. Considering the prevailing situation and keeping the prices of rice within the purchasing capacity especially of the lower- and middle-income groups, the government had no option, but to increase rice production, a high official of the Ministry of Agriculture (MoA) said. The agriculture ministry official further said that cultivation of high-yielding varieties of paddies must be needed to increase rice production. The arable land of the country decreases due to use of it for non-agriculture purposes, posing a threat to the increased production of rice, according to the MoA. The consumption of rice has been increasing day by day due to the inclusion of 2.2 to 2.4 million new faces with existing



population plus one million Rohingyas living in the country and also using rice for fish cultivation purposes. The BRI-89 and BRI-92 varieties could yield around one maund of paddy on each decimal of land, said the MoA. According to the BBS (Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics) and the Ministry of Food rice production was 37.5 million tonnes and import was 1.35 million tonnes during the last fiscal year (FY '21) in the country.



# Economy Survey: Despite Covid-19 shock Agriculture Sector grows at 3.9% in 2021-22 and 3.6% in 2020-21

he Agriculture sector which accounts for 18.8 percent of Gross Value Added (GVA) of the country in 2021-22 has experienced buoyant growth in the past 2 years. It grew at 3.9 percent in 2021-22 and 3.6 percent in 2020-21 showing resilience in the face of COVID-19 shock states the Economic Survey 2021-22 tabled in the Parliament by the Union Finance & Corporate Affairs Minister, Smt. Nirmala Sitharaman. The Survey attributes this to "good monsoon, various Government measures to enhance credit availability, improve investments, create market facility, promote infrastructure development and increased provision of quality inputs to the sector". It also said that the growth in the allied sector is in line with the recommendations of the Committee on Doubling Farmers' Income. Stating that the agriculture sector has experienced buoyant growth in the past two years, the Economic Survey noted that the agriculture and allied sector is the largest employer of workforce as it accounted for a sizeable 18.8 per cent (2021-22) in Gross Value Added (GVA) of the country. Growth in allied sectors including livestock, dairying and fisheries has been the major drivers of overall growth in the sector, and these are steadily emerging to be high growth sectors. "The livestock sector has grown at a CAGR of 8.15 percent over the last five years ending 2019-20. As revealed by the latest Situation Assessment Survey (SAS), the sector has been a stable source of income across groups of agricultural households accounting for about 15 percent of their average monthly income," the Economic Survey said.

"This improvement in the contribution of allied sectors is in line with the recommendations of the Committee on Doubling Farmers' Income which has suggested a greater focus on allied sectors



to improve farmers' income." The latest SAS report has also shown that the fragmentation of landholdings has led to alternate sources such as livestock, fishery and wage labour becoming significantly important for an agricultural household. "Increasing importance of allied sectors including animal husbandry, dairying and fisheries in growth and income of the farmers indicates that focus needs to shift more towards harnessing the potential of allied activities. There is also a need to improve productivity of small and marginal farmers through development and implementation of small holding farm technologies," the document said.

The document also discusses how Minimum Support Price (MSP) policy is being used to promote crop diversification. Important findings of the latest Situation Assessment Survey suggested the net receipts from crop production alone have increased by 22.6 percent as compared to the previous SAS Report of 2014 although there is a visible diversification in the sources of income of the farmers. While

the government has adopted the use of MSP as signal to encourage crop diversification, there is also a need for coordinated action from the state governments to facilitate the shift to high value and less water consuming crops to enable realisation of the objective of doubling farmers' income in a sustainable way. The government has also taken measures to augment production and domestic supply of oilseeds and edible oils, interventions made in the sugar sector and promotion of crop diversification. The government has placed focus on the food processing sector, which is not only a major market of agricultural produce but is also a significant employer of the surplus workforce engaged in agriculture. Pointing out that India runs one of the largest food management programmes in the world, the Economic Survey said: "The government has further extended the coverage of the food security network through additional provisions of food grains through the schemes like PM Gareeb Kalyan Yojana (PMGKY)."

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# Union Budget 2022-23: Allied farm, food processing sectors get further push; to promote drones, start-ups

he Union Budget seeks to complement macro-economic level growth with a focus on micro-economic level all inclusive welfare. The Union Minister for Finance & Corporate Affairs, Smt Nirmala Sitharaman tabled the Union Budget 2022-23 in Parliament on 01st February 2022. In a bid to tap the allied farm and food processing sectors to boost farmers' income, the government proposed higher budget allocation for these two sectors for the next fiscal, besides announcing finance support for startups, promotion of Kisan drones and PPP mode for delivery of high tech agri-services to farmers. The government has also raised the farm credit. target to Rs 18 lakh crore for 2022-23 from Rs 16.50 lakh crore this fiscal, Presenting the Union Budget in the Lok Sabha. Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said inclusive development is one of the four priorities of the government moving forward. The Budget allocation for the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare has been raised marginally by 4.5 percent to Rs 1,32,513 crore for 2022-23 fiscal. However, the Budget allocation for the Ministry of Fisheries, Animal Husbandry and Dairying has been increased by 44 per cent to Rs 6,407.31 crore and for Food Processing Industries by 2.25 times to Rs 2.941.99 crore for the next fiscal. The Finance Minister said as part of the inclusive development, the government will implement a "rationalised and comprehensive scheme" to increase domestic oilseed production, thereby reducing the country's dependence on the import of edible oils. The government will also bring in legislative and policy changes to promote agro-forestry and implement a comprehensive package, with states to adopt suitable varieties of fruits and vegetables that can be processed.

Further, the government will promote the use of 'Kisan Drones' for crop assessment.

digitisation of land records and spraying of insecticides, she added. To finance startups and rural enterprises working in agri-space, the minister said the government will facilitate a fund with blended capital raised under the coinvestment model through NABARD. "This is to finance startups for agriculture and rural enterprise relevant for farm produce value chain," she noted. The activities of these startups will include inter-area support for farmer-producer organisations (FPOs), machinery for farmers on a rental basis at the farm level and technology, including invitee base, she added. The Finance Minister further said the government will promote chemical-free natural farming throughout the country with a focus on farmers lands in fivekilometre wide corridors along the river Ganga in the first stage. For the delivery of digital and high-tech services to farmers, she said the government will launch a scheme of public-private partnership (PPP) model with the involvement of public sector research and extension institutions along with private agri-tech players and stakeholders of agri value chains. States will be encouraged to revise syllabi of agricultural universities to meet the needs of natural zero budget and organic farming, modern-day agriculture, value addition and management, she added. For the fertiliser subsidy, the Budget has made an allocation of Rs 1,05,222 crore, about 25 percent lower than the revised estimates of previous year's Rs 1,40,122 crore. Of the total outlay for the fertiliser sector for 2022-23, Rs 63,222 crore has been earmarked for urea (Rs 75,930 crore RE 2021-22) alone and Rs 42,000 crore for the nutrient-based subsidy (Rs 64,192 crore RE 2021-22) for phosphatic and potassic fertilisers.

The Finance Minister said that Indian Railways will develop new products and efficient logistics services for small farmers and Small and Medium Enterprises. On the procurement of agri-crops, the minister said the government's procurement of



wheat and paddy at the minimum support price (MSP) during 2021-22 will cover 1,208 lakh tonnes from 163 lakh farmers. "Rs 2.37 lakh crore will be the direct payment of MSP value to their accounts." Sitharaman said. As 2023 has been announced as the International Year of Millets, she said the government will support post-harvest support for enhancing domestic consumption of millet products internationally. For the next fiscal, the government has allocated an estimated budget of Rs 6,75,000 crore for PM-KISAN, Rs 15,500 crore for the crop insurance scheme. Rs 7.183 crore for the Krishonnati Yojana, Rs 10,433 crore for the Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana (RKVY) and about Rs 1,500 crore for Market Intervention Scheme-Price Support Scheme.

Meanwhile, Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar in a statement halled the Budget proposals saying unprecedented provisions have been made for the overall development of the farm sector. Tomar, in a statement, said the Budget allocation for the sector has been increased continuously and the Finance Minister has shown vision in the Budget 2022. There is emphasis on increasing farm production and productivity in the Budget, adequate provisions have been made available for the oilseeds mission, linking agriculture with technology and for farmers to get fair price for their produce, he said. The unprecedented provisions made for agricultural diversification, promotion of organic and natural farming, increasing capacity efficiency of farmers, Kisan drones, Irrigation, adding courses in agricultural universities and agricultural research - will bring about a paradigm shift in the farm sector, he added. Meenesh Shah, Chairman, National Dairy Development Board said "NDDB welcomes reduction in alternate minimum tax for cooperatives from 18.5% to 15% & Surcharge from 12% to 7% for cooperatives having income Rs 1 to 10 cr. The decision will boost development initiatives of dairy cooperatives and ensure better remuneration for millions of farmers." The Solvent Extractors Association of India (SEA) welcomed the announcement made by the finance minister for a

comprehensive scheme to increase domestic production of oilseeds to reduce the country's dependence on import of edible oil. "We are also given to understand that financial outlay for increasing oilseed production is likely to be adequate to have a meaningful

Impact. This initiative should go a long way in helping reduce our dependence on edible oil imports, which are likely to be around Rs 1.5 lakh crore during the current year and would be in line with our Prime Minister's vision of Atmanirbharta." SEA added.

# In 2022, sown areas under buckwheat will be increased in Russia

ccording to preliminary data, 921.4 thousand tons of buckwheat were harvested in Russia in 2021, which is 3.2% more than a year earlier. The resulting volume will fully ensure the loading of processing enterprises. In the current year, an increase in sown areas under crops by 5.5% is forecasted. Thus, according to the plan, sowing of buckwheat will exceed 1 million hectares (1031.7 thousand hectares), which will minimize risks even in case of adverse weather factors. Cultivation is carried out in 49 subjects of the Russian Federation. The leading regions, which account for about 75% of the gross harvest, include the Altai Territory, the Republic of Bashkortostan, the Kursk, Voronezh and Oryol regions. Currently, buckwheat production in Russia fully covers the needs of the domestic market. The Ministry of Agriculture is carrying out systematic work aimed at expanding the sown area, introducing modern technologies, increasing the volume of mineral fertilizers and using high-yielding varieties of this crop. These and other measures contribute to the growth of cereal production and form a sustainable raw material base for the processing industry.

## Organic food market gains ground in Qatar

atar's organic food market which has been witnessing a steady pace of growth over the past several years, is building further traction as more residents are coming out of the pandemic with a renewed resolve to adopt a healthier lifestyle. Export agency Bolst Global noted that the increasing popularity of organic products throughout Qatar presents great opportunity for international brands to enter the market. According to Global Organic Trade Guide, health & wellness products consumption in Qatar was valued at \$728.4m in 2021 with a CAGR growth rate of 5.4 percent, and is expected to reach \$778.9m this year. Organic beverages consumption was

estimated to grow from \$14.1m last year to \$16.6m in 2022 with a CAGR rate of 15.2 percent. The report also estimated that organic packaged food and beverages consumption in Qatar will grow from \$17.2m in 2021 to \$20m this year, while organic packaged food consumption will grow from \$3.1m last year to \$3.5m this year with a CAGR rate of 8.3 percent. Qatar's most popular organic

product categories are savoury snacks, grab-and-go fruit, seed and nut bars, and kitchen staples such as oils, flours, tinned goods, and preserves, the report added.



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# ISMA revises upward sugar output at 314.5 lakh tonnes in 2021-22

ndia's sugar production estimate has been revised upward by 3% to 314.5 lakh tonnes for 2021-22 marketing year ending September as against the earlier forecast of 305 lakh tonnes, according to industry body ISMA. Releasing its second advance estimates, Indian Sugar Mills Association (ISMA) said, "The country is expected to produce 314.50 lakh tonnes of sugar during 2021-22 season." Sugar marketing year runs from October to September. Sugar output stood at 311.8 lakh tonnes in the 2020-21. season. "This is after considering an estimated diversion of sugar equivalent of 34 lakh tonnes for production of ethanol by means of diversion of sugarcane Juice /syrup or B-heavy molasses," the association said in a statement. Sugar production in Uttar Pradesh is seen at 102 lakh tonnes in 2021-22 as against 110.59 lakh tonnes in the previous year due to lower cane yields and lower sugar recoveries along with much higher diversion of sugar for production of ethanol by way of diversion of B-heavy molasses and sugarcane juice, It is

estimated that about 12.55 lakh tonnes of sugar will be diverted for ethanol production by the sugar mills in UP in the current year as compared to about 6.90 lakh tonnes diverted in 2020-21.

Maharashtra is expected to produce about 117 lakh tonnes in 2021-22 as against 106.50 lakh tonnes produced in 2020-21. Higher estimated sugar production this year is mainly due to increased cane area by about 11% and better cane yields and sugar recovery as compared to the last season. "This is owing to favourable weather conditions as well as increase in percentage of ratoon cane, which helps in better recovery," ISMA said. Based on the allocations made by the OMCs for supply of ethanol in 2021-22 so far and expected to be allocated in the current season, it is estimated that sugar mills in Maharashtra will divert about 11.27 lakh tonnes of sugar equivalent for production of ethanol in the current year, which is much higher as compared to about 7.12 lakh tonnes diverted in 2020-21. Karnataka is expected to produce about 45.21 lakh tonnes of sugar in 2021-22 as against 44.68 lakh

tonnes produced in 2020-21. Mills in the State are expected to divert about 7.37 lakh tonnes of sugar equivalent for ethanol production in the current year as compared to about 5.02 lakh tonne diverted in 2020-21.

On demand, ISMA said sugar mills have sold 69.06 lakh tonnes during October-December of this marketing year, up around 1.5 lakh tonnes from the year-ago period. With the demand for sugar picking up, the association estimated that the domestic consumption of sugar would be around 270 lakh tonnes in 2021-22. Sugar exports during October-December guarter rose to 16.23 lakh tonnes as against 4.49 lakh tonnes in the corresponding period of the previous year. "Export contracts for around 40 lakh tonnes have already been entered into, and therefore the market is very positive that India will be able to export 60 lakh tonnes in the current season quite comfortably by the end of September 2022," the statement said. Considering an opening stock of about 82 lakh tonnes on October 1, 2021, and domestic consumption of 270 lakh tonnes, sugar exports of 60 lakh tonnes and the estimated production of 314.5 lakh tonnes, ISMA said the closing stocks as of September 30, 2022, are expected to be around 66.50 lakh tonnes.

The Union Minister of State for Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution, Ms. Sadhvi Niranjan Jyoti in a written reply to a question in Lok Sabha informed that since, sugar season 2010-11 (Oct-Sept), there has been surplus production of sugar in the country (except in sugar season 2016-17 due to drought) as against the domestic consumption. With a view to facilitate export of surplus sugar thereby improving liquidity of sugar mills and enabling them to clear cane price dues of farmers, Government has been extending assistance to sugar mills. It is also estimated that in sugar season 2021-22, about 50-60 LMT of sugar is likely to be exported by domestic sugar mills. Till 31 January 2022, 26.5 LMT sugar has been exported by mills. Further, to facilitate export of surplus sugar from country, custom duty on export of sugar has been withdrawn by the Central Government w.e.f. 20.03.2018.

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# Non-basmati rice exports may exceed target on strong buys from China, Bangladesh

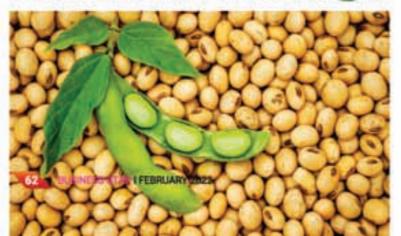
s non-basmati rice shipments clock a 52 percent growth in the first nine months on robust purchases by countries such as China and Bangladesh, exporters are hopeful of exceeding the targeted 16 million tonnes (mt) for the current fiscal. Non-basmati rice shipments crossed 12.53 mt in April-December 2021 as compared to 8.25 million tonnes in the same period last year. In value terms, the non-basmati rice shipments were up 46 percent at \$4,48 billion as compared to \$3.07 billion in same period last year. In 2020-21, India's nonbasmati rice exports stood at 13.08 mt valued at \$4.796 billion compared with 5.03 mt valued at \$2.034 billion in the previous year. 'We were targetting 16 million tonnes for the current financial year. Going by the current trend, the shipments may touch 17 million tonnes,' BV Krishna Rao, President of The Rice Exporters Association, said. Largest buyer this year, so far, Bangladesh has purchased a record 1.53 mt against a mere 13,811 tonnes in the same period last year. In value terms, the Bangladesh rice purchases were over \$596 million (\$13.47 million). 'Bangladesh, which has been an aggressive buyer since January last year, has slowed down purchases now. China's purchases are seen topping a million tonnes. We feel China's purchases will be more as long as the corn prices are high. China is buying brokens to meet the feed requirements,' Rao said.

China has imported about 9.05 lakh tonnes in April-December compared with 33,705 tonnes in the same period last year. In value terms, China's rice buys from India has exceeded \$275 million (\$10.29 million). Similarly, other countries which have scaled up their purchases include Vietnam, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Senegal, Somalia and Indonesia among others. Vietnam has bought over half a million tonnes during April-Dec this year, more than eleven times that of the same period previous year. Vietnam



imported 5.66 lakh tonnes valued at \$187 million as compared to 48,581 tonnes valued at \$15.4 million in the previous year. Some markets like Nepal, Mozambique are stable, while several countries including Malaysia, Togo, Saudi Arabia, the UAE, Russia and Iraq have scaled down their purchases. As per the first advance estimates, India is expected to harvest a record 107.04 mt of rice, the main kharif cereal crop. Kharif planting of rice was at a record 411.46 lakh ha over the normal area of 395.66 lakh ha. However, in the ongoing rabi season, the rice acreage has seen a decline at 23.61 lakh ha as on January 21, over the normal area for the season of 42.5 lakh ha.

# Argentina exchange cuts soybean harvest outlook after drought



rgentina's Buenos Aires grains exchange cut its forecast for the 2021/22 soybean harvest to 42 million tonnes, down from 44 million tonnes previously, due to lower yields and a smaller planting area. than originally planned. Argentina is the world's leading exporter of processed soybean oil and meal and the third largest exporter of unprocessed beans. In December-January it suffered a severe drought with high temperatures that damaged crops. "Lack of surface moisture on both ends of the agricultural area held back initial planting plans," the Buenos Aires exchange said in its crop report. "What's more, as a consequence of high temperatures and tight water reserves in core regions during critical periods, the performance potential could record losses of up to 30%." In the 2020/21 cycle, Argentina's soybean production was 43.1 million tonnes, according to the exchange.





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# Severe drought lowers Turkey's wheat harvest

ue to severe drought, Turkey's 2021-22 wheat production is down 2 million tonnes, to 16.25 million tonnes, according to a report from the Foreign Agricultural Service of the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). Looking ahead to next year, rainfall levels from October to December were better compared to the same period a year ago. However, the rising cost of agricultural inputs and the government's continued market interventions may dampen spring planting decisions, the USDA said. Wheat import estimates for 2021-22 are revised slightly downward to 10.8 million tonnes but remain 2.7 million tonnes higher than the previous year because of the increased need for imports resulting from the drought losses. According to the Turkish Statistic Institute (TUIK), Turkey's wheat imports during the first six months of 2021-22 increased by 20% year-over-year, reaching 5.3 million tonnes. Russia and Ukraine were the main suppliers.

Turkey's wheat exports, including wheat products, are forecast slightly higher at 6.55 million tonnes, which is close to the previous year's export level. This estimate assumes better flour exports than last year, and stable exports of pasta and transshipped wheat to neighboring countries. Turkey's wheat flour exports during the first six months of 2021-22 were just above last year's exports of the same period, reaching 1.67 million tonnes. Turkey continues to struggle with food inflation, which stems from major grain production losses, depreciation of the Turkish lira, rising international commodity prices and higher input costs. The Turkish government has undertaken various measures to minimize rising inflation. On Dec. 31, 2021, the government extended its zero-import duty for corn, wheat, barley, rye, and oats throughout calendar year 2022. In addition to tariff cuts, in the summer of 2021, President Erdogan instructed the Turkish Grain Board (TMO) to initiate a "Flour and Feed Regulation Action," which is a long-term strategy for regulating flour and feed prices.

# Millets: APEDA aims at doubling footprint in 100 countries

s 2023 has been announced as the International Year of Millets, India's agri export promotion body, APEDA, wants to expand the country's export footprint in 100 countries from current 50 countries, in the next two years. Besides, it is working on strategies to boost overall agriculture products' exports in countries other than top buyers. 'Currently, our products are going to about 190 countries from about 150 countries a decade ago. The challenge is to improve the volume in other than the top 10 countries while sustaining growth in major buying nations,' said Dr. M Angamuthu, chairman of Agricultural and Processed Food Products Export Development Authority (APEDA). The world's millets market is estimated to grow to over \$12 billion by 2025 from the current \$9 billion. Although India's shares in the production of millets is around 41 percent with an annual output of about 12 million tonnes (mt), the country's exports were 87,558 tonnes in 2020-21, up by 16.32 percent from 75,274 tonnes in the previous year. The bulk of India's exports - as much as 60 percent - go to Nepal, United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia. The share of top ten countries in the total volume is 87 percent.

During the Budget, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman said, 'Support will be provided for post-harvest value addition, enhancing domestic consumption, and for branding millet products nationally and internationally.' Dr. Angamuthu said APEDA has already signed an MoU with Indian Institute of Millet Research (IIMR) for export oriented production of millets and for making a strategy for their promotion in the international market. It has organised many virtual buyer-seller meetings where officials of Indian embassies were also present during this pandemic. With an increasing demand for gluten-free food products across the globe, particularly after the pandemic, millets have found place in the kitchen as a preferred items because they contain calcium, iron and fibers which help fortify essential nutrients in children.

# South Korean rice imports decline

upply chain issues hampered South Korean rice imports in the final quarter of 2021, leading to a 11% decrease in imports from the previous marketing year, according to a Global Agricultural Information Network report from the Foreign Agricultural Service of the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). South Korea's estimated rice import total of 418,336 tonnes for 2020-21 was 16% lower than the previous USDA forecast, which was made last fall. The rice import forecast for 2021-22 has been revised upward to 490,000 tonnes, a 19% increase, due to actual delivery of some 2021 tariff rate quota contacts moving to 2022. Imports of MY2020/21 U.S. rice were 142,291 MT (milled basis), down 11.1 percent from the previous forecast. Overall rice imports totaled \$378 million, up 1.7 percent from MY2019/20. Imports from the United States amounted to \$140 million, up 7.1. percent. The USDA estimated this year's rice output in South Korea at 3.88 million tonnes, up 10% from the previous year, while rice consumption is virtually unchanged from 2020-21 at 3.96 million tonnes.

As in many Asian countries, rice consumption has been declining in South Korea in recent years, having fallen four consecutive years since a recent peak of 4.7 million tonnes in 2017-18. Per capita rice consumption has declined from 59.2 kilograms in 2018-19 to a projected 55.3 kilograms in 2021-22, according to the USDA. South Koreans' consumption of rice hit an all-time low in 2021, but the decreasing rate slowed on the back of a growing demand for home meals amid the COVID-19 pandemic, data showed. The average South Korean consumed 56.9 kilograms of rice last year, down 1.4 percent or 0.8 kilograms from the previous year, according to the data compiled by Statistics Korea. Rice is a key staple food for Koreans, but its consumption has been on a steady decline since 1980 due mainly to changes in diet and eating habits. The 2021 figure had more than halved compared with 30 years ago, when the amount stood at 116.3 kg. In 1980, per capita average annual rice consumption stood at 132.4 kg, the data showed.





# Agriculture experts cultivate purple wheat variety at AGC farms

ooking for healthy dietary solutions to growing lifestyle problems and breaking a new ground in the farming sector, a team of faculty and farming experts at agro farms in Amritsar Group of Colleges (AGC), Manawala, have now cultivated purple wheat. The team had already cultivated a variety of black rice, red rice, and black wheat as part of its agro technology learning programme for students of agricultural sciences. Purple wheat is among the three varieties of coloured wheat that was developed by the team of researchers at Mohali's National Agri-Food Biotechnology Institute (NABI). It is rich in anthocyanins, proteins, dietary fiber, vitamins, and minerals. It has more iron and zinc than normal wheat. Ragini Sharma, one of the directors, AGC, said the new variety of wheat had been grown through a natural method. "We used vermicompost in fish water to raise the level of yield and to achieve other targets in wheat. Vermicompost is nutrient-rich organic compost. Rather than using it directly in the field of purple wheat, if it is combined with fish water it would give better results. We have been using fish to create liquid manure for a variety of crops in our farms. They primarily release nutrients in the water body and application of such water as irrigation in wheat crop improve quality and increase yield," she said.



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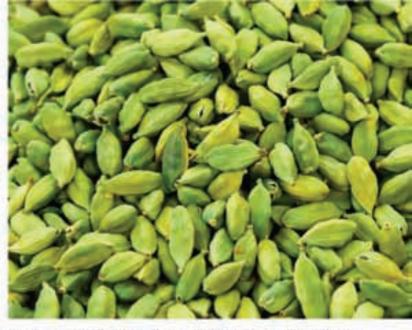

# Spices Board puts cap on cardamom pooling in e-auctions

pices Board has come to the aid of cardamom growers to arrest the dip in prices. To safeguard the growers' interest, the Board has taken some interim measures by incorporating certain changes in e-auction system. The maximum quantity permitted for pooling of cardamom for an e-auction by a licensed auctioneer is now limited to 65 tonnes for an initial period of four weeks. The pooling of cardamom by licensed dealers is limited to 30 per cent of the total pooling scheduled auction during this period. The desirability of continuing with these changes would be evaluated after four weeks and further modification required, if any, for the industry's betterment will be decided by the Board after discussions with all the stakeholders.



All the licensed auctioneers are directed to comply with the conditions for conducting the e-auction, it may be recalled that the Board had convened a meeting with the farming community after they sought the intervention of the authorities to put a cap on cardamom arrivals in the auctions due to price drop.

# Spain expects to produce 1.25M tons of olive oil in current crop year

ith the olive harvest well underway in Spain, authorities expect to produce 1.25 million tons of olive oil in the 2021/22 crop year, which would amount to approximately 42 percent of the global olive oil production. This confirms forecasts made a few months ago by the Food information and Control Agency (AICA) and corroborated by the Union of Small Farmers and Ranchers (UPA) Andalusia. The predictions were based on the effects of prolonged drought on the olive groves in 2021. Rainfall in May was insufficient and did not alleviate the problem. According to Cristóbal Cano, UPA Andalsuia's general-secretary for olives and olive oil, initial production estimates were correct. "We will narrowly exceed 1.2 million tons of olive oil this campaign," he said. Cano also confirmed that 354,000 tons of olive oil, including imports, had been marketed in Spain after the first three months of the 2021/22 crop year, which started in October.



# Dubai: 1,343 new food outlets opened in Emirate in 2021

total of 1,343 new food establishments were launched in Dubai in 2021, Dubai Municipality revealed. The number of food establishments in Dubal has been increased by 50 percent during the past year. As a result, the number of inspections also increased by 12 percent compared to 2020, said Sultan Al Taher, the director of food safety department at Dubai Municipality. The department has carried out 76,195 inspection visits to food establishments in the Emirate last year. He said, "The Municipality has monitored a great level of commitment by food establishments to abide by the procedures and requirements that it has set, in terms of public safety measures during recent periods." The Municipality checks food establishments in the emirate of various activities, such as restaurants, cafeterias, cafes that offer food, groceries, supermarkets, and bakeries.



# Thailand aims to ship 7 mln tonnes of rice in 2022 as outlook improves



hailand has set a rice export target at 7 million tonnes this year, 14.6% higher than in 2021, the leading rice exporters body said. The world's third-largest rice exporter shipped 6.11 million tonnes of the grain last year and 5.7 million tonnes in 2020, the lowest volume in two decades. Thailand's biggest rice buyers in 2021 include China, Japan, the UAE, the Philippines, Congo, Syria, Benin and Angola. Rice exports should benefit this year from a more stable baht making prices more competitive and better weather conditions, according to Chookiat Ophaswongse, honorary president of the Thai Rice

Exporters Association. For the 2021/2022 harvest season, the association expects rice production to increase to 30-32 million tonnes of paddy rice or 20 million of milled rice, up from 27-28 million tonnes of paddy rice or 17 million tonnes in the 2020/2021 season. "It's a brighter outlook this year than the last two, in which drought undermined our production and the baht was too strong," Mr Chookiat said. A shipping container crunch and higher global freight rates, which affected last year's exports, had also started to ease, he said. "We should overtake Vietnam this year and become the world's second-largest exporter," he said.

Thai rice export volumes declined for three consecutive years after hitting a record high of 11.6 million tonnes in 2017. Thailand recorded its lowest export volume in two decades in 2020 and slipped to third place in global rankings after being overtaken by Vietnam, which shipped half a million tonnes more of the grain that year. A global economic recovery should also boost Thai rice sales, as customers gain greater purchasing power, Mr Chookiat said. Thai rice is trading around \$20 per tonne higher than similar Vietnamese grades. "In the past two years, people just bought whatever was the cheapest," he said. "But now they have more power to choose better quality rice, even if it's slightly more expensive." Meanwhile, India still remains the top rice exporter for four consecutive years with 19.5 million tonnes of rice exported in 2021, up 33.9 percent year-on-year. Vietnam came in second with 6.24 million tonnes exported last year, dropping 5.2. percent year-on-year. Pakistan and the US, meanwhile, are in fourth and fifth places, with 3.93 million tonnes and 2.85 million tonnes of rice exported in 2021, respectively.

#### EU soft wheat stocks to rise on higher imports

he European Commission on Jan. 27 revised its forecast of European Union soft wheat stocks upward due to sharply increased imports. The Commission forecasts soft wheat stocks to reach 13.3 million tonnes at the end of the 2021-22 marketing year, a four-year high and increase from its December projection of 12.9 million tonnes. The Commission revised the EU's soft wheat imports higher by 500,000 tonnes for an overall total of 2 million tonnes. The Commission made few other revisions to its common wheat supply and demand balance sheet, with 2021/22 usable production trimmed marginally to 130.5 million tonnes from 130.6 million previously, and projected EU wheat exports unchanged at 32.0 million tonnes. In contrast, a cut

to expected barley imports to 1.0 million tonnes from 1.3 million led the Commission to lower its forecast of 2021/22 barley stocks to 4.15 million tonnes from 4.5 million. For maize, the Commission cut its forecast of 2021/22 usable production in EU's 27 member countries to 69.0 million tonnes from 69.4 million. Combined with a sharp rise in projected maize exports, to 5.0 million tonnes from 3.7 million forecast in December, that brought down expected maize ending stocks to 17.3 million tonnes from 18.9 million. The Commission left its forecast of EU maize imports in 2021/22 unchanged at 14.5 million tonnes.

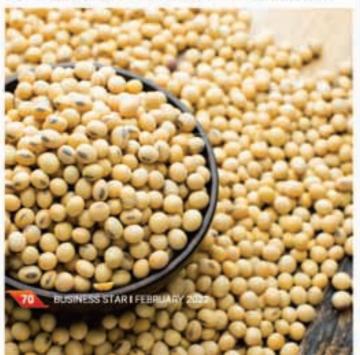




#### Brazil's January soybean exports at 2.47 mil mt

Brazil's soybean exports surged to 2.47 million mt over Jan. 1-30 from 49,498 mt a year earlier, the country's foreign trade department Secex said in a report. The country is the world's biggest soybean producer and exporter, and the bulk of its soybean exports in January were to China, the world's largest soybean importer, according to local traders. Brazil's soybean harvest for crop year 2021-22 (September-August) started well ahead of the typical schedule, supporting export volumes, with the harvest in the states of Mato Grosso and Parana almost three weeks ahead of last year's pace. Agricultural consultancy AgRural said Brazil's harvest had reached 10% of the projected area of 40.4 million hectares by Jan. 27, up from 2% a year earlier. The harvest has been well ahead of schedule on the back of steady progress in Mato Grosso, Rondonia and Parana, AgRural said in a report released Jan. 31.

Brazil exported a record 86.1 million mt of soybeans in 2021, sending 70% of the total to China, the Secex report showed. According to average estimates, Brazil is expected to export over 90 million mt of beans in 2022. However, drought-led cuts in the output forecast could slow shipments in coming months. AgRural has lowered its crop year 2021-22 (September-August) output forecast for Brazilian soybeans to 128.5 million mt, down 17 million mt from estimates in November, and more agencies were expected to reduce their forecasts amid a prolonged drought in the country's south. Soybean yield has declined in the three southern states and in Mato Grosso do Sul, where crops were under prolonged heat stress amid below-average rainfall throughout January, AgRural said. There was also a slight negative adjustment in output estimates in Mato Grosso due to losses caused by heavy rainfall in the mid-north of the state, it added.





# Govt extends stock limits on edible oils, oilseeds till June

n a bid to further cool down edible oil prices and curb hoarding, the Centre on Friday extended stock limits on edible oils and oilseeds till June 30. Besides, the government has specified the stock limits that have to be imposed by states that have not implemented the earlier order on the limits. In October 2021, the Ministry of Consumer Affairs had imposed stock limits till March 2022 and left the decision to states to decide on the stock limits based on available stock and consumption pattern. In pursuance with the Centre's October 2021 order, six states — Uttar Pradesh, Karnataka, Himachal Pradesh, Telangana, Rajasthan and Bihar — had imposed the stock limits in their respective states. Many states had not imposed the stock limits. The ministry felt that implementation of stock limits across all states was necessary to transfer the full benefit of price control to the end-consumer, an official statement said.

"In an effort to further cool down the prices of edible oils, the government has taken various steps, latest being an order notified on February 3, 2022 specifying the stock limit quantities on edible oils and oilseeds up to June, 30," it said. For edible oils, the stock limit would be 30 quintals for retailers, 500 quintals for wholesalers, 30 quintals for retail outlets of bulk consumers i.e. big chain retailers and shops and 1,000 quintals for its depots. Processors of edible oils would be able to stock 90 days of their storage capacities. For edible oilseeds, the stock limit would be 100 quintals for retailers and 2,000 quintals for wholesalers. Processors of edible oilseeds would be able to stock 90 days production of edible oils as per daily input production capacity, the statement said. Exporters and importers have been kept outside the purview of this order with some caveats, it added.





#### **Export of Organic Foodgrains**

he National Centre for Organic Farming (NCOF), under the Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, is the nodal organization for organic farming in the country. NCOF implements the National Project on Organic Farming (NPOF) to promote production, certification and marketing of organic products. The National Programme for Organic Production (NPOP), introduced by the Department of Commerce, is aimed at regulation and promotion of organic production for exports. The Agricultural & Processed Food Products Export Development Authority (APEDA) has been mandated with implementation of NPOP and export promotion of organic products. APEDA provides assistance to the exporters of organic products under various components of its export promotion scheme. APEDA also undertakes various activities to promote exports of organic products viz. addition of new products under NPOP, making efforts to get NPOP standards recognized by the importing countries, promoting 'India Organic' brand through participation in international trade fairs and exhibitions, organising Buyer-Seller Meets (BSMs), organising capacity building and outreach programmes etc.

India's exports of organic products amounted to USD 1.04 billion during 2020-21. Organic foodgrains are being exported from the country mainly under the category Cereal & Millets. During 2020-21, 59908 MT of organic products under the category 'Cereal & Millets', worth 76 million USD, have been exported from India under the National Programme for Organic Production (NPOP). The Government of India has been promoting Organic farming in the country, including in Bundelkhand and Uttarakhand, through dedicated schemes namely Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY) and Mission Organic Value Chain Development for North Eastern Region (MOVCDNER) since 2015-16 to cater to the needs of domestic and export markets respectively. Marketing and branding have been integral part of organic farming schemes. Assistance of Rs 6800/ ha under PKVY and Rs 5000/ ha under MOVCDNER is provided for marketing, branding and trade. Brand 'Organic Uttarakhand' has been developed under PKVY for the State of Uttarakhand. This information was given by the Minister of State in the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Smt. Anupriya Patel, in a written reply in the Lok Sabha.

ethods for recovering oil from spent bleaching earth are described. It has been found that maximum adsorption of fluoride from aqueous solutions take place at pH-value of 3.5. Secondorder equation was used to describe the adsorption rate of fluoride and adsorption rate constant was calculated.

Spent oil industry is flourishing day by day. This industry is fulfilling the 1st need of the BIODIESEL PLANTS, the soap industry, chemical industry and poultry feed industry. The spent oil is recovered from used bleaching earth of refineries. The solvent extraction plant recovers 18% to 22% oil from the used bleaching earth.

Some refineries are further refining the solvent extracted spent oil, to make it useable for the poultry industry. They reduce the FFA from 30 to 3 FFA.

At present solvent plant without refining is not viable. The company who wants to enter in the extraction of oil from spent earth must attach refining unit with solvent plant.

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#### Govt may continue rice subsidy for ethanol to reduce stock

s paddy procurement rises every year, much above the 28 million tonnes (mt) official annual requirement for distribution under the National Food Security Act (NFSA), the government is likely to continue to offer rice from the central pool stock for ethanol for the next five year at subsidy rates, potentially reducing stock by 10 mt over and above normal offtake. As the centre has approved about 860 crore litres capacity of grain based ethanol plants, taking the total capacity of grain-based units to about 1100 crore litres by including the existing plants, as much as 22-23 mt of rice will be required if all these plants use rice as feedstock. However, as all these approved proposals may not materialise and some plants may use maize as feed stock, there may be about 10-11 mt of rice seem to be utilised by these plants, which is enough 440-480 crore litres, an official said.

In 2020-21, apart from 35.6 mt offtake of rice under NFSA and other regular schemes, the government could reduce the stock by additional 19.6 mt through distribution under the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana (PMGKAY). Incidentally, the procurement of rice increased to record 60.19 mt in 2020-21

(October – September), up by over 16 percent from the previous year. Rice stock with FCI was at 53.89 mt (including unmilled paddy in terms of rice) as on January 1, 2022, which was more than seven times the stocking norm of 7.61 mt. Besides, the high stock of rice also after as much as 36 offtake reported under all schemes during April-December 2021. Due to the rising level of procurement as well as increase in MSP every year, the food subsidy claims of FCI has gone up to Rs 217,460 crore (for 2021-22) against Rs 109600 crore in 2016-17.



#### Kazakhstan to lift restrictions on sunflower oil exports in June

he Ministry of Agriculture of the Republic of Kazakhstan plans to make a number of changes to the order dated December 13, 2021, which restricts the export of sunflower seeds and oil from it. In particular, the quota limit for one applicant will be reduced, and the restriction on the export of butter will be lifted a month earlier. If a new order is adopted, the guota for the export of sunflower oil will be increased from 110,000 to 114,000 tons. At the same time, the quota will be valid until June 1, 2022. Previously, restrictions were planned to be lifted only on July 1. Restrictions on the export of sunflower seeds have been maintained in the amount of 125 thousand tons for a period until July 1. It is planned that the monthly limit per applicant for the export of sunflower seeds will be no more than 1000 tons, for the export of sunflower oil no more than 80% of the manufacturer's production capacity. In addition, the new Rules specify that the quota is issued for products manufactured in the territory of the Republic of Kazakhstan. As the

Ministry of Agriculture explained, during the period of quotas, six trading companies filed applications for the export of Russian-made sunflower oil in the amount of 9.6 thousand tons. At the same time, in Russia, until August 31, 2022, a prohibitive duty on sunflower seeds is set at 50%, but not less than \$ 320 per ton, on sunflower oil - an export customs duty, monthly recalculated taking into account the dynamics of world prices.

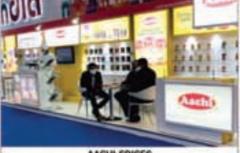

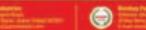

# China lifts restrictions on Russian wheat, barley imports

hina will allow imports of wheat and barley from all regions of Russia, the Russian state agricultural that could lead to greater competition for other suppliers like. France. The move, announced as part of agreements signed during President Vladimir Putin's visit to Beijing, means China will no longer restrict trade in the cereals to certain parts of Russia, raising the prospect of Russia being able to send large vessels through the key Black Sea export route. Russia is the world's biggest wheat-exporting country while China has emerged as a major wheat importer, bringing in record volumes last year. China has become a key outlet for French wheat in the past two years and its importance has grown this year as the European Union's top wheat supplier has lost market share in Algeria. Russia has gained a foothold in the Algerian and Saudi markets after those countries changed their import tender terms. China had previously restricted imports of Russian grain due to phytosanitary concerns. Next. year, the two countries plan to reach a deal that will allow Russia to export peas to China, the Russian agricultural watchdog added in a statement.

#### USDA pegs Illinois No. 1 for soybeans, No. 2 for corn output

SDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service final crop production estimates for 2021 confirm a bin-buster harvest. But, strong demand estimates coupled with production issues elsewhere in the world could keep the pressure on prices. Nationwide, soybean production totaled a record 4,44 billion bushels (up 5% from 2020) with an average yield of 51.4 bushels per acre (up 0.4 of a bushel). Corn production was estimated at 15.11 billion bushels (up 7% from 2020 and the second-largest on record) with a record yield of 177 bushels per acre. In Illinois, soybean production totaled 672 million bushels with an average yield of 64 bushels per acre (up 4 from 2020). Both are tops in the nation and the yield is a new state record, surpassing the previous mark of 63.5 bushels recorded in 2018. Corn production in Illinois finished at 2.19 billion bushels (second-highest in the nation behind lowa) with an average yield of 202 bushels per acre (up 21 bushels from the previous year and second-highest in the Corn Belt). It's the second-highest corn yield average in history in Illinois, behind the current record of 210 bushels in 2018.

USDA estimated 2021 sorghum production at 448 million bushels, up 20% from last year due to a 24% rise in acres. The average sorghum yield (69 bushels) was down 4.2% from the previous year. USDA's quarterly stocks report pegged crops stored in all positions as of Dec. 1 totaled 11.6 billion bushels of corn (up 3% from the previous year), 3.15 billion bushels of beans (up 7%) and 1.39 billion bushels of wheat (down 18%). USDA raised ending stocks by 47 million bushels for corn (to 1.54 billion bushels), 10 million bushels of soybeans (350 million) and 30 million bushels for wheat (628 million) in its world ag supply and demand estimates report. As for wheat, Illinois harvested 610,000 acres last year with a record statewide yield of 79 bushels per acre. USDA estimates farmers planted 34.4 million acres of winter wheat last fall, up 750,000 from the previous year.

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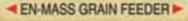
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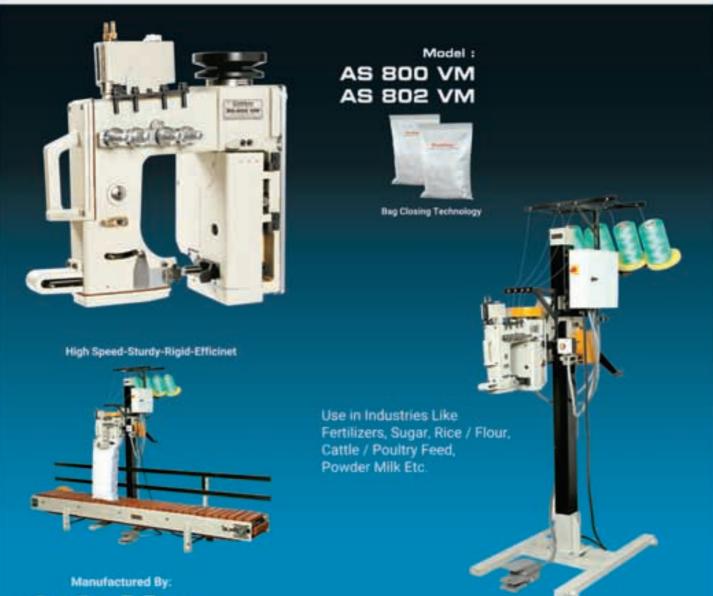




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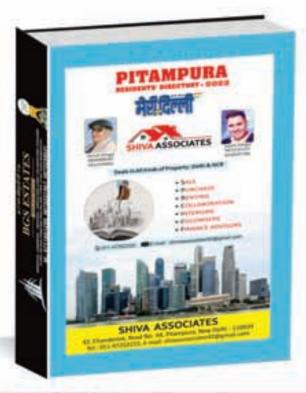

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# US whole wheat flour production down in 2021

hole wheat flour production in 2021 was 19.964 million cwts, down 157,000 cwts, or 0.8%, from 20.121 million cwts in 2020, according to data issued Feb. 1 by the National Agricultural Statistics Service of the US Department of Agriculture, The annual figure was the smallest since NASS began tracking whole wheat flour (and all flour) production data in 2014. Since peaking in 2015 at 24.115 million cwts, annual production of whole wheat flour has fallen 4.151 million cwts, or 17%. Whole wheat flour production held in a steady range of 22.2 million to 22.6 million cwts in the four years ended 2019, before falling to just over 20 million cwts in 2020 and just under 20 million cwts in 2021. At 19.964 million cwts, whole wheat flour accounted for 4.7% of total US flour production in 2021, the same percentage as in 2020 and down from 5.3% in 2019. The share of US flour production accounted for by whole wheat peaked in 2015 at 5.7%. Whole wheat flour production accounted for 4.9% of total flour production in the fourth quarter of 2021, up from 4.7% in the third quarter and 4.5% in the fourth guarter of 2019.

While trends were weak in total whole wheat flour production in 2021, the same was not true for whole wheat semolina. Production of whole wheat semolina in 2020 was 883,000 cwts.



up 4.7% from 616,000 cwts in 2020. Whole wheat semolina production was 644,000 in 2019 and 604,000 cwts in 2018. The 883,000-cwt total was the highest since NASS began tracking the figure. The 2021 figure was boosted by a surge in fourth-quarter production. October-December 2021 production of whole wheat semolina was 355,000 cwts, up 208,000 cwts, or 142%, from 147,000 cwts in the fourth guarter of 2020. It was the second consecutive quarter of strong whole wheat semolina production. Third-quarter production was 238,000 cwts, up 78% from a year earlier. Production of whole wheat flour ex-semolina in 2020 was 19.081 million cwts, down 2.2% from 19.505 million cwts in 2020 and compared with 21.595 million in 2019 and 21.739 million in 2018. In the fourth quarter, whole wheat flour ex-semolina production was 4.909 million cwts, up 204,000 cwts, or 4.3%, from 4.705 million cwts in the fourth quarter of 2020. Fourthguarter production was up 3.7% from 4.736 million cwts in the third guarter of 2021.

# Cambodia ships more than 53,000 tonnes of milled rice in January 2022



ambodia shipped some 53,036 tonnes of milled rice in the first month of this year, netting \$35.72 million. The update was provided by the Cambodian Rice Federa tion (CRF), indicating that the exported amount saw an increase of 54.75 percent compared to the same period in 2021. China remains the biggest market, importing 31,181 tonnes or 58.79 percent of Cambodian milled rice, followed by 16 EU countries and 3 ASEAN nations buying 12,542 tonnes and 6,277 tonnes of the product respectively. The remaining 3,072 tonnes or 5.52 percent of the milled rice, were shipped to 13 other destinations. Additionally, the country exported some 275,511 tonnes of paddy rice to neighbouring countries, generating \$60.61 million. In 2021, a total of 617.069 tonnes of Cambodian milled rice worth \$418 million were exported to China, 24 EU countries and 7 ASEAN member states. The Kingdom also sold about 3.53 million tonnes of paddy rice with an estimated price of \$846 million to neighbouring countries, mainly Vietnam.





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PM kickstarts 50th Anniversary Celebrations of ICRISAT and inaugurates two research facilities

he Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi visited the International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT) campus in Patancheru, Hyderabad and kickstarted the 50th Anniversary celebrations of ICRISAT. He appreciated their contribution in water and soil management, improvement in crop variety, on-farm diversity and livestock integration. here are several factors including weather conditions causing fluctuations in prices for Tomato, Onion and Potato (TOP) crops such as arrivals from non-traditional areas/other parts of country; season-wise change in crop-sowing pattern; early arrival of crop from next Rabi/Kharif season and residual of previous season's crop etc. Ministry of Food Processing Industries provides transportation /storage subsidy @50% for notified fruits & vegetables including (TOP) crops at the time of glut situation during harvest season under short term intervention of scheme of Operation Greens (OG) which helps in price

stabilization for farmers as well as consumers. The Ministry is also maintaining Market Intelligence & Early Warning System (MIEWS) Portal to keep watch on current prices of Tomato, Onion and Potato (TOP) crops through National Agricultural Cooperative Marketing Federation of India Ltd. (NAFED) and accordingly, low price alerts are issued to concerned departments of States from time to time. 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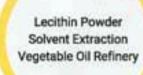














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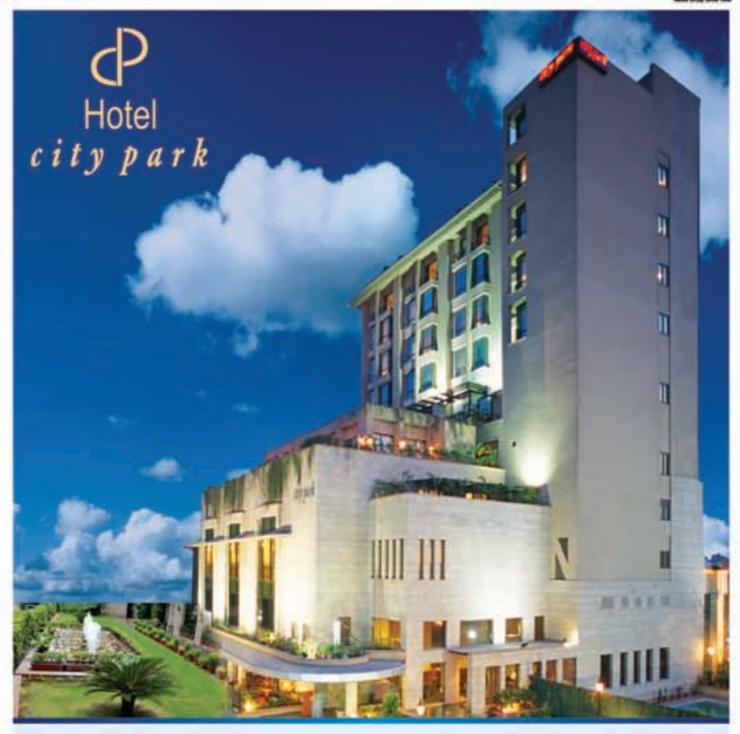


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
